Online Safety



What is Discord?

- Discord was launched in 2015 as a platform for people to connect online whilst playing video games, and since then it has expanded beyond this to become a widely used text, video, and audio chat app.
- Discord can be accessed on computers, smartphone and tablets, with an email address needed to set up an account.
- Discord hosts servers, which are chat rooms based around a particular interest or activity. These are set up with a particular focus or theme as a way for people to meet up online to discuss and exchange images, links and information. These servers offer both text channels and voice chat via a microphone.

What are the concerns?

- Moderation within these servers has historically been mostly left to the members themselves, with Discord relying on user reports and private server owners to catch worrying behaviour.
- Unlike most popular social media platforms where users post photos of themselves and tend to use real names, it is an almost universal practice on Discord to employ usernames and profile pictures because they are not connected to identities.
- It is considered normal to interact with strangers on Discord without having any sense of who they are, what age they are, what their name is, or any other identifying traits. This means that it is very easy for strangers to have contact with young people without revealing their true identity.
- Discord is extremely popular with children and teens, and while the app is intended for ages 13+, there is no meaningful age verification to enforce this age limit, or to ensure that the few child protection measures Discord offers are actually applied.
- Children can and do easily enter a false date of birth to bypass the age restriction. For example, servers and individual channels within servers can be age-gated with a "NSFW" tag (*Not Safe For Work*), but that protection is easily bypassed due to the lack of meaningful age verification. Such

- servers often contain adult material, which children can be exposed to.

What steps can be taken to ensure safety?

- Explain to your child why age restrictions are important. It can be easy for young people to bypass age restrictions, but they must understand the dangers of doing so.
- Ensure privacy and safety settings are enabled. Your child's experience on Discord will be much safer if they can only receive messages or friend requests from server members.
- Inappropriate content can be filtered out using the privacy and safety settings.
