

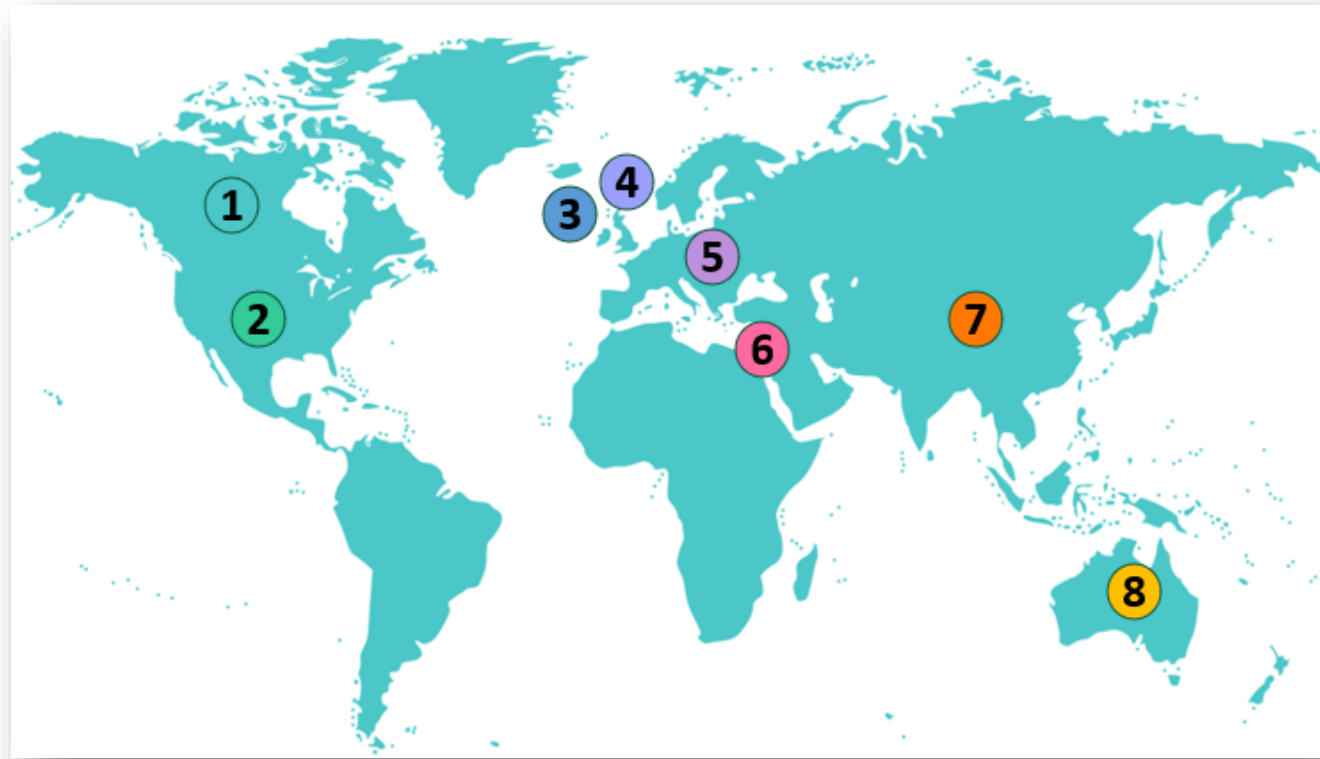

Universities around the world

1. Canada

Academic information:

- Apply to a 'faculty' and not a specific major
- Co-op programmes (integral work placement)

Language:

- Official languages are English and French

Budget:

- Varies depending on the province or territory
- Tuition fees are often lower than in the US / UK

Location:

- Canada has a diverse landscape
- You can study in cities like the University of Toronto or rural campuses like the University of Prince Edward Island.



Universities around the world

2. US

Academic information:

- Apply 'undeclared' and choose a major later
- Different types of 'colleges' available

Language:

- English is the official language

Budget:

- Higher tuition fees than many other countries
- Financial aid and scholarships available

Location:

- US colleges have something for everyone: from the surf and sushi vibes of California to the charm and hospitality of Tennessee, to the uber-cool metropolitan New York City



Universities around the world

3. Ireland

Academic information:

- 7 universities and 14 Institutes of Technology
- Highly competitive for prestigious universities

Language:

- English and Gaeilge (Irish)

Budget:

- Varies on the university but is often cheaper than UK, US and some parts of Europe

Location:

- Rich culture and stunning scenery
- Study at historic universities like Trinity College Dublin or rural universities like Maynooth University in Kildare surrounded by farmland and forests



Universities around the world

4. United Kingdom

Academic information:

- Apply directly to specific degree programmes unlike choosing your major later on

Language:

- English

Budget:

- British students can access government loans
- International students pay more in tuition fees

Location:

- Small country with a diverse landscape
- Choose between urban centres like London, or campus universities in smaller towns and cities like Oxford in England, St Andrews in Scotland or Royal Holloway University outside London

5. Europe

| Language: | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• More than 120 official European languages |
| Budget: | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Often lower than the UK, US or Australia and some provide free tuition for home or EU/EEA status |
| Location: | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Europe contains the world's largest country (Russia) and the smallest (Vatican City)• Easy to travel between countries as Europe's interrail network is 170,860km long – travel 1600km (Paris to Warsaw) without changing trains! |



Universities around the world

6. Middle East and Africa

Academic information:

- Many universities recognised for teaching excellence (in the top 500 world rankings)

Common languages:

- Middle East: Arabic, Turkish, Persian, and Hebrew
- Africa: Arabic, Hausa, Swahili, and Yoruba

Budget:

- Varies but relatively high

Location:

- Arabian and African cultures are unique and diverse - from traditional landmarks like the Blue Mosque sitting alongside modern cities, to the view of Dakar in Senegal from the 160ft-high African Renaissance Monument



Universities around the world

7. Asia

Academic information:

- 11,000+ English speaking programmes

Language:

- English is widely spoken in some parts of Asia – taking a course in the local language is useful

Budget:

- Fees are lower than in Europe, but the cost of living is high in places like Singapore / Hong Kong

Location:

- Huge continent - 60% of the world's population
- Two of the new Seven Wonders - the Great Wall of China and the Taj Mahal
- Travel is often cheap, so it's easy to experience the diverse ways of life of neighbouring countries



Universities around the world

8. Australasia

Academic information:

- Many students take double or conjoint degrees (study two degrees in a shorter time)

Language:

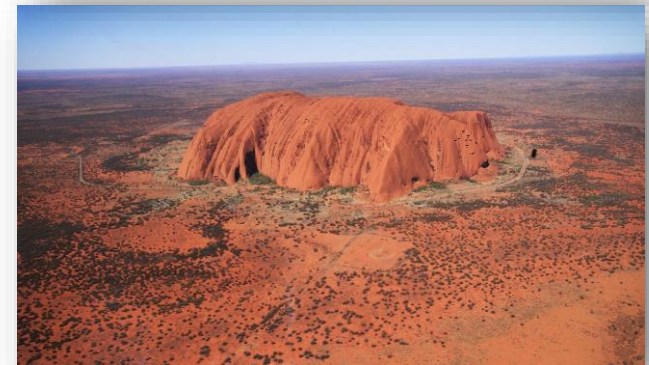
- English is spoken in Australia and New Zealand
- Māori is the indigenous language of New Zealand

Budget:

- Varies but lower than the US or UK - the cost of living is high in major cities like Sydney

Location:

- Popular cities for international students include Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, and Perth
- From Uluru to the Great Barrier Reef to the Tongariro Crossing, Australasia is home to some of the most beautiful landmarks in the world
